BOND UPDATE

As the new Superintendent, I'm thrilled the community united in support of our children and the district's long-term facilities needs through the bond passed in 2016. The Board of Education and Administration take this vote of confidence seriously and are working hard to maximize every public dollar.

To make these large construction projects a reality requires the dedication and expertise of a number of professional architects, construction managers, and building planners working in collaboration and cooperation with district and building administrators. We are fully focused on that effort.

As a reminder, in May, 2016, Comstock voters approved a \$40,130,000 bond. To maximize the number of dollars available for construction, these dollars will be spent in three series over the course of nine years. The money must be spent for improvements and preservation of the district's buildings and facilities. By issuing the bonds in

three series, the overall interest costs are less than if the bonds were issued all at once.

To help ensure the best construction results possible, the Board of Education completed an exhaustive bid and interview process which resulted in the employment of two keys firms - GMB Architects and Miller Davis Construction.

GMB is a Michigan firm based in Grand Rapids with a local office in Holland. The company has over 50 years of experience and specializes in mechanical engineering, electrical engineering, interior design, landscape architecture, civil engineering, structural engineering, and a full range of K-12 pre-bond marketing services.

GMB has over 100 employees in nine architectural disciplines. The role of these professionals is twofold - to provide the district with a master plan for the projects as well as to design specific locations for rooms, offices, entrances, and utilities. The architects continually meet with the administration to find out what the schools need and then engage in proposing specific designs that balance those needs with the

monies available in the bond.

Miller Davis is a Kalamazoo firm with its office located conveniently downtown. The company was founded in 1909 and provides general contracting, construction management, and construction consulting services. These professionals work hand in hand with the architects and the school administration and oversee the actual construction projects. After the district finalizes the architectural designs and cost projections, Miller Davis hires the specialized construction companies that actually do the work - masons, electricians, plumbers, roofers, tilers, and a host of other companies.

Since our buildings are all older, federal regulations regarding lead and asbestos require abatement companies to remove the dangerous materials safely and properly. These costs are factored into the overall budget. Essentially, our counterparts at Miller Davis act as our advocates during construction and ensure that these varying companies work together collaboratively and complete their contractual obligations according to detailed specifications and required timelines.

I am pleased to announce that Phase I is now nearly complete. This phase included front office and secure entry renovations at all buildings, remodeled bathrooms across the district, and high school locker room rebuilds.

Both Phases II and III are currently in design discussions. While all buildings will experience improvements, the main focus of Phase II is on NEMS. It is fair to say that the school is being "gutted" and completely rebuilt from within. We are extremely excited by early designs and concepts.

As with Phase II, Phase III also touches all buildings but emphasis will be on redesigning the interior of the high school. It is important to note that through this bond, both NEMS and CHS will be completely air conditioned when the rebuilds are finished. For more details, see the district's website. How the Ski & Snowboard Club works...

First, members buy a Bittersweet Membership Card for \$17. They show this card at Bittersweet every time they go. The discount card provides a large reduction off lift tickets and equipment rentals, if needed. So the membership card helps a lot with cost!

For students who want to ride the Ski Club bus, there is a one time fee (amount to be determined) for transportation. This pays for seven trips on Thursdays after school beginning in January. The bus leaves the high school at 2:45 p.m., goes to NEMS and picks up the middle school club members and then heads out to Bittersweet. The bus departs Bittersweet at 7:45 p.m. and returns to the high school for parent pick up at 8:20 p.m. The first Ski Club trip is scheduled for Thursday, January 10.

COSTS FOR SEASON:

*Membership card = \$17 (pay one time) (Bittersweet waiver & money due on 12/7)
*Lift ticket = 7 trips x \$17 = \$119 (Pay \$17 at window each time you go; no pre-pay)

High School Students Join in College Month Activities

October was College Month in Michigan and Comstock's seniors participated in a number of activities from submitting college applications to visiting colleges.

Applications: With help from the College and Career Academy (CCA), seniors submitted 176 applications during the month. Of these applications, 112 were sent to 21 different Michigan institutions, while the remaining 64 were sent to 47 out-of-state institutions.

Financial Aid: During two separate Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) Completion Nights, 40 seniors submitted their FAFSA forms, accumulating over \$87,000 in Pell grants alone. Furthermore, the CCA hosted its fourth annual Scholarship Night in partnership with the Kalamazoo Community Foundation. Thirty-one seniors and their family members learned about the many academic awards available from the Foundation which grants over \$1 million to students in Kalamazoo County annually.

College Exposure: Representatives from 16 different postsecondary institutions visited the high school during October for their annual visits. These

are in-school opportunities, open to all grade levels, where students can learn more about an individual college from admissions representatives. These are also the very people who review and make decisions about the applications of CHS seniors.

The CCA also took 20 underclassmen to an evening College Fair at KVCC's Texas Township campus. Representatives from over 90 different postsecondary institutions were available to answer questions concerning anything about the post-high school transition. Students are always encouraged

to attend this annual event.

Finally, the CCA took 41 students to an all-expenses-paid campus visit to Grand Valley State University in Allendale, Michigan. Students learned about the admission process, listened to a student panel, took a campus tour, and ate in the all-you-can-eat dining hall.

Whether it's a two-year college, a four-year university or a trades certificate program, it's all college.

The legal profession's loss is Comstock's gain. That's because the district's new special education teacher consultant, Lindsay Clark, originally intended to be a

lawyer, majoring in political science and social studies.

However, she decided to become an educator.

"I loved the idea of being a positive part of kids' childhood," she said. "I loved coaching and wanted to help kids make great memories."

A graduate of Hartford High School in Hartford, Michigan, she earned a bachelor's degree from Western Michigan University and a master's from Calvin College.

She taught for five years in the Crawford-AuSable district in Grayling and then two years in the Bloomingdale Public Schools in Bloomingdale.

An influential teacher in her life was Robert Teske who taught government and economics at Hartford. In fact, Mr. Teske not only taught Lindsay and her younger sister but also their father.

"He taught us that teaching wasn't just about the content, but about the role you play in children's beliefs and values," she said.

Mrs. Lindsay is a newlywed, having married her husband, Eric, this summer. He is a social worker. She is now the "bonus mom" to two children, Oliver, 4, and Emerson Jean, 2.

She enjoys traveling, including trips to Guatemala each summer to conduct

Jason Fritz, Comstock's new band teacher, still remembers what he received for Christmas his senior year of high school. It was his very own band instrument,

a euphonium (also called a baritone) so he no longer had to use a school instrument.

"My family all threw in together to buy me my own instrument," he said. "It was literally the only present I got that Christmas. It affected me greatly, and it was then that I decided I wanted to teach music."

During his days at Bangor High School, he was always the student assigned to help others, a task which he enjoyed, he said. As a result, several influential people told him he would be a good teacher.

"I wanted to do something with my life that would have a real impact on the real world," he said. "Being a teacher seemed like the best use of my time and talents."

After receiving his bachelor's degree in music education from Grand Valley State University, he was band director in Standish-Sterling near Bay City and then moved to Concord for six years where he built a band program.

After that, he taught at the International Community School of Addis Ababa in Ethiopia. Returning to the States, he entered graduate school at WMU where he worked with the Bronco Band and taught beginning conducting for music majors.

He then worked in the Behavioral Education Center in Bangor, subbed at Comstock for six months in the 2014-15 school year, returned to Concord, and then came back to Comstock this year as band director upon the retirement of Mark Nelson.

The most influential teacher in his life was the supervisor of his master's work at Western, Dr. David Montgomery, who was associate director of bands at WMU and also director of the Bronco Band.

"He has this incredible knack for being kind and caring while at the same time pushing each of his students to achieve at the highest levels," said Mr. Fritz. "His approach with students and his methods for organizing a successful band program have truly helped me to be a stronger teacher."

Regarding his family, Mr. Fritz says he won the "cosmic lottery." His parents have been married for 43 years. He still spends time with his brothers and nieces and nephews helping out on the family farm in Bangor where he grew up.

His wife, Dani, a 2001 graduate of CHS, is a writer, having had her first novel published last spring. She is also a volunteer with the marching band.

"She is an integral part of the teaching staff for the high school marching band," he said.

Mr. Fritz enjoys cooking, gardening, fishing and riding his motorcycle.

"When I have the time, I also occasionally make cheese," he said. "Mozzarella and feta are my two best so far, and for my next batch, I am going to start aging some brie."

VFW Donates \$2200 to High School Band

The dedication of your Band and these kids has helped the parade be a great success year after year."

Because of that dedication, the VFW donated money to the band to be used as deemed appropriate.

The checks were presented to Mr. Fritz and the band during halftime at the final home football

Comstock High School band director, Jason game of the season. In addition to the \$1000 from the VFW which the band was aware of, the Auxiliary surprised them with another \$1000 donation. There was also a \$200 check from the Dads of Foreign Service Vets.

> During their halftime performance, the Band of Blue honored the VFW by recognizing VFW members who attended the game and by playing "America the Beautiful" to thank veterans for their service.

> Mr. Fritz was thrilled with the donation but also notes that it is important on many levels, not just the financial one.

> "For me as a teacher, I think the biggest impact is because it shows our students that they are important, that the things that they do matter in the bigger world," he said. "We gladly perform our civic duties as a band with no expectation of thanks or praise. It is our honor to be there."

The donation also speaks to the kindness that's in the world despite all the bad things reported in the news, he said.

"There are people in our community who feel compelled on their own to contribute to our cause unsolicited," he said. "Our students must have had a tremendous impact on them. And our local VFW must consist of incredibly kind and thoughtful people, but we already knew that."

Mr. Fritz plans to use the money for instruction and equipment for a drumming program involving musicians from the community as well as the band. One idea he has in mind is a hand drumming class which could be taught by a friend of his who has studied drumming in Ghana.

"I'm hoping to collaborate with the EFA Dance program for a combined performance of drummers and dancers in the spring," he said.

STEM Academy

Students Connect Through Global Read Aloud

STEM Academy middle school English students America, South America, Europe, and Oceania. joined over 1.5 million kids around the world this fall in the Global Read Aloud program.

The program which began in 2010 had a simple goal from the beginning - having students read one book as a way of making connections. Since the program's inception, over four million students have participated.

This fall sixth and seventh graders in Danielle Tennant's English classes at the STEM Academy read "Amal Unbound" by Aisha Saeed while eighth graders read "Refugee" by Alan Gratz.

"Amal Unbound" is about a Pakistani girl forced into indentured servitude while "Refugee" tells the story of refugees from three different eras: Nazi Germany, 1990s Cuba and contemporary Syria.

Comstock's STEM Academy students partnered with different schools to discuss the books. For example, they have recorded video discussions through FlipGrid to share with partner classrooms in Canada.

They also participated in video chats with schools in Wisconsin and Canada.

In addition, they have commented on other students' blogs and have written postcards about the book which were mailed to schools in North

They are now receiving postcards in return and are excited to hear what different students from around the world think about they books they have read.

During the event held at the Battle Creek/Kalamazoo International Airport, students experienced simulators, learned about the science of flight, became familiar with the aviation alphabet, and created paper airplanes.

Students also sat in the cockpit of a Boeing 737 FedEx plane. WMU aviation students conducted informational tours about the different parts of the plane. Students even saw the "black box" and

learned about its purpose.

They also visited the Cirrus SR20 aircraft which is used by WMU students studying to become professional pilots.

Following these events, students went into the maintenance hangar to participate in a paper airplane contest. Students were organized by grade levels in a challenge to see whose paper airplanes could go the farthest. Adults even participated.

Winners received a 3D printed trophy created by STEM Academy art teacher, Jeannine Roys. They also received a book about airplanes provided by the STEM Academy Parent Teacher Group (PTG).




Kindergartners pondered the meaning of candy with a KIA docent.
